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The $1\frac{1}{2}$ story frame Palmer House is gable roofed and rests on a stone foundation. The most important element of the house is its construction. It is constructed of vertical chestnut planks running from floor to roof and varying in width from 18" to 30" and all 3" thick. The house is covered with narrow clapboard. Floors are 1-1/8" thick plank and the structural beams are hand hewn.

The main entrance is centrally placed on the east end of the building and is flanked by single windows. There are two small windows in the gable. Many additions and alterations have been made including an entrance and a dormer on the south facade. The dormer has three windows and the entry is flanked by two windows on either side and has a small raised stoop protected by a bracketed hood. All windows are presently one over one.

The house was moved by the school board in 1915, and at that time an L-shaped portion of the structure was removed from the north side. It is likely that the Palmer House will be moved again soon to a town park since the school board needs the land for further expansion. It will be permanently leased to the Northfield Historical Society and maintained as a museum.

Only by removing the siding and plaster will original and altered fenestration, as well as other structural questions about the house be answered.

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STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The land on which the Palmer House sits was purchased from the Connecticut Land Company by Hezekiah and Abigail Palmer who came to Northfield from New York state about 1819. William Palmer, a son, purchased the land from his parents and built the house in 1852. The house and land remained in the Palmer name until 1903. In 1915 the property was bought by the Northfield Board of Education. The house was then moved from the south side of the 35 acre lot to the north side. The house was used as offices by the Board until 1954, then converted into a library and used as such until 1965. The Historical Society of Olde Northfield leased the house from the Board and began restoring it to house their exhibits.

While completing repairs in 1965, it was discovered that the house, which was the first frame dwelling in Northfield, was built of "plank wall" construction. There are few other known buildings employing this construction technique in Ohio, and of those, the Palmer House is the only one using vertical, rather than horizontal, planks. The Rufus Putnam house in Marietta also used plank wall construction: four inch poplar planks mortised and pinned to vertical posts placed at the corners. Plank construction was used in many late 18th century military forts in Ohio and in some domestic buildings, especially in New England. These examples are all of horizontal, not vertical, planks. It is not known how many other vertical plank wall structures there are in Ohio, but for the present, the Palmer House is somewhat unique.

The origin of horizontal plank wall construction is unclear. An article in a 1971 issue of the Journal of the Society of Architectural Historians call plank wall construction the only indigenous Canadian construction technique. It is still widely used in Quebec today. It is not stated, however, when the method first came into use in Canada. Plank wall construction in Ohio may be attributed to itinerant Canadian carpenters, or may be just a coincidental experiment in construction by local carpenters. In either case,




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
