DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This is a large one-story building of sandstone construction. The stonework is of squared rubble, some vermiculated and some rock-faced. The jambs of the openings are large vertical slabs and square blocks. The building is unusually long for its height, having seven bays on the side elevations. This is due to the fact that it was originally a two-story building. The second story was removed around 1920 and a new roof added. The present roof has a plain eaves line with no cornice or frieze.

On the narrow end facing east there are three openings on the ground floor. The center one is a door and the other two are windows which were formerly doors. The two second-story windows on the east end were formerly full height, as can be seen from the wooden lintels and the different stonework above the openings.

On the west end a one-story addition of cement block was erected around 1920 to provide a kitchen. At the same time most of the window openings were made smaller by filling in the lower half with masonry. The interior is one large room, used for exhibit space and meetings.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This was the last building of an important educational institution and virtually a one-man school in Summit County which lasted over half a century. It is also an unusual example of vernacular stone construction.

The founder and mainstay of the Twinsburg Institute was Samuel Bissell. Born in 1797 in Middlefield, Massachusetts, he was brought to Ohio with his parents in 1806. At an early age he decided to get an education and was tutored in Aurora. In 1816 he went back to Massachusetts, determined to enter college. After making up the necessary work he was admitted to Yale and graduated in 1823. He then studied theology and became a minister.

In 1826 he returned to Aurora and taught at nearby Western Reserve College in Hudson. In 1828 he became pastor at the Congregational Church in Twinsburg. He soon began a school in a nearby log house. In 1837 he built his own school house, in which he taught for 29 years.

By 1848 four buildings were in use, and there were 300 students and seven teachers and assistants. The Institute never received a charter or any public funds. The tuition was very low, so that all could attend. Many Indians of the Seneca, Ottawa and Potawatomi tribes were among the students. A range of courses was taught including classical and modern languages and constituting the complete classical curriculum of mid-nineteenth century education.

At the onset of the Civil War, there were financial difficulties, and some of the buildings were sold to pay debts of around \$6,000. Then Samuel Bissell began all over again, erecting the present stone building in 1866-1867. Although he was 70 years old, the manual labor was largely done by himself. In an account of 1881, Bissell was still teaching at the age of 84, and 6,000 students had attended the Institute.

With Bissell's death at the age of 98 the Institute passed out of existence. The stone building was acquired by the Twinsburg Grange in 1920, and in 1964 it was transferred to the Twinsburg Historical Society.


