Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The group consists of four stone structures at the main entrance of the cemetery: An office building, just inside the gate on the south side of the entrance drive; a bell tower on a hill behind the office; a caretaker's residence diagonally across the entrance drive from the office; Memorial Chapel, 225 feet southwest of the office.

CARETAKER'S RESIDENCE (1869)

Originally known as the lodge, this sandstone structure has rock-faced, coursed ashlar walls and a truncated hip roof of asphalt shingles. Main block has center entry under projecting gabled porch with pointed arch opening. Bays flanking entry have paired double-hung windows with stone surrounds, beveled sills and carved lintels. South bay has steep pitched mansard roof with truncated hip-roofed dormers containing lancet windows with diamond tracery. Triangular dormer above entry; gabled dormer above north bay of main block. Recessed wing to north has double-hung windows with diamond tracery. Gabled porch-entry that was formerly on south end of structure was severely damaged by a sewer line explosion in 1977 and has been removed. Cemetery officials hope to restore it.

MEMORIAL CHAPEL (1875-76)

Built on cruciform plan, this Victorian Gothic structure has random rock-faced ashlar walls with quoins. Steep-pitched gabled roof of gray slate is surmounted by a central spire. Raised open arcaded narthex of three Tudor arches has a colossal portal flanked by pictorial stained glass windows. Above entry in gable end is a pointed arch containing a rose window with tracery. Opposite this, at west end of nave, is a pointed arch window divided by heavy stone mullions into three vertical openings which terminate in Gothic points and intersect a five-pointed star above. Central panel of colored glass depicts Col. Lewis P. Buckley, former commander of 29th Regiment, Ohio Volunteer Infantry. South transept window, of similar design, has vertical panels depicting George Washington, Oliver Hazard Perry and Abraham Lincoln. North transept window, damaged by the 1977 sewer line explosion, has been restored and will be reinstalled It commemorates the wartime sacrifice and service of women.

BELL TOWER (1883)

This rock-faced random ashlar structure is 15 feet in diameter and 60 feet high. Open belfry, surrounded by a wood railing, is topped by a concave hipped roof. Just below the belfry are four evenly spaced stone turrets that project from the tower as half-rounds. Below and centered between them at varying heights are four slit windows.

OFFICE BUILDING (1903)

This rock-faced, coursed ashlar structure has central gabled wall dormers on all four sides of its hipped, asphalt shingle roof. A veranda supported by square wooden posts on stone pedestals extends across the facade and wraps around the west end. Central entry is flanked on both sides by three double-hung windows.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)


The four stone structures at the main entrance of the cemetery constitute the most significant group of Gothic buildings in the city of Akron. The centerpiece, Memorial Chapel, is a superlative example of the high Victorian Gothic style and one of the finest buildings designed by a notable local architect of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, Frank O. Weary. (Other-buildings by Mr. Weary include the Akron Art Institute, which was formerly the city's Carnegie Library, and Buchtel Hall at the University of Akron.)


Memorial Chapel was erected in 1875-76 at a cost of \$25,000 with funds raised by Buckley Post, Grand Army of the Republic. It was dedicated on Memorial Day, 1876, to the memory of Akron area soldiers of the Union army who died in the Civil War. The chapel is listed in the historic landmark survey that was conducted in 1978 for the city of Akron's Department of Planning and Urban Development. That survey recorded only three other Akron buildings that are truly representative of the high Victorian Gothic style: St. Paul's Sunday School and Parish House, 354 E. Market St. (added to the National Register in 1976); Hammel-Actual College, 57 E. Market St.; and the Kaiser Building, 325 S. Main St., which has suffered greatly from street level "modernization" since the landmark survey was completed.

Also included in the landmark survey are the cemetery office building and the caretaker's residence. These well designed and interesting structures together with the handsome bell tower, complement Memorial Chapel by their siting and are in architectural harmony with it.

Akron Rural Cemetery, chartered in 1839, was headed for the first 41 years of its existence by Simon Perkins, Jr., one of Akron's most prominent figures and a son of the city's co-founder, General Simon Perkins. As the years passed, the cemetery's environs became more urban than rural. For that reason and because it is bounded on the north by Glendale Avenue, people began to call it "Glendale" and it is now known to the public only by that name. Nonetheless, the corporate name remains Akron Rural Cemetery.
