


This home was built for Mr. Thomas W. Smith in 1936. The architecture is Georgian Revival.





766 Merriman Road


This home was built in 1924 for Mr. Earl R. Shiers. The wood siding was originally brown. The home probably did not have shutters on the second floor window.


810 Merriman Road

RESIDENCE OF MRS. DELLA WILCOX, AKRON, OHIO









2. Colonial Revival

Merriman Road

This architectural style, Colonial Revival (1880-1955), dominated the American residential scene throughout the first half of the 20th century. Common features of the Colonial Revival are accentuated front doors with decorative pediment, windows in adjacent pairs, symmetrical front facades, and windows with double hung sashes. After briefly passing from favor in mid-century, the style has recently reappeared in somewhat different form as a dominant Neoeclectic style.

Situated in a quiet, stately neighborhood, this asymmetrical Colonial Revival is complemented by 3 acres of colorful landscape and open greens. Exterior construction materials include raw stone, brick, and painted clapboard. Although a Colonial Revival style residence in essence, the home often breaks from traditional form - lending feelings of uniqueness and character. Examples of this are the asymmetrical front facade with discreet off-centered front doorway located to the right of the front gable. Only about 10 percent of Colonial Revival houses have asymmetrical facades, a feature rarely seen on their colonial prototypes. Also found are gabled roofs with side wings and a large, prominent bay window with sectional panes. The front facade is dominated by a main entrance with broken pediment and the exterior painting scheme includes a white base contrasted by black shutters.

As one enters the front door, the scene is immediately warm and inviting with interesting attractions in all directions. From open doorways to panoramic windows, one enjoys a feeling of spaciousness. The present owners have done well in blending light colors with appealing furnishings, intermixed with unique antiques. Highlights include the dining room with two exquisite colorful canvas murals of landscape scenes at Stan Hywet Hall and Gardens.

Hidden spaces and concealed niches are found throughout the home, including a secluded "Secret Room." Visitors can be refreshed in the living room with a sip of liquid from the 1860s "gentleman's cabinet" or be "lifted into the sky" in the elaborate study. The many bedrooms all speak of different tastes and are professionally decorated to accent the interests of the owners. The masterbedroom suite features pocket doors, unrestricted space and a serene fireplace. With an absence of a basement, the "gathering room" on the second floor has become a haven for friends and family alike to converge and relax.

While glancing at the open meadow lined with majestic "Out of Africa" trees in the backyard it is easy to imagine why the home is called "Gathering Place." The raised brick patio is situated perfectly to take advantage of the scenic landscape below. A short flight of stairs leads to an elaborate pool surrounded by both white fencing and a colorful arrangement of flowers. The owners have wisely resisted the temptation to make this home pretentious or too grand; for all its beauty and grace, the house is, as it always was, a comfortable living space.






