COMMUNITY IMPACT & **PARTNERSHIPS**

ASCPL's Friends of the Library (FOL) groups play an important role in supporting the Library system. Each of the Library's 19 locations receives assistance from that location's FOL group, in support of programming, resources, and more.







Friends groups contribute to special events featuring guest speakers, authors, crafters, and other presenters, as well as many other Library initiatives. To raise funds for the Library, each location's FOL group welcomes donations for their regularly scheduled and ongoing book sales. Additionally, the Friends of Main Library operate the Library Shop at Main.

ASCPL's long-running Paws for Reading program pairs early readers with certified therapy dogs. Studies show that reading to a therapy dog is a great way for children to build reading fluency and confidence in a criticism-free environment. Therapy dogs are known for their gentle and patient nature, and these interactions create a positive association with reading and encourage children to engage with books.





A project in partnership with the Akron Art Museum, the Akron Art Library features 91 original works of art. These pieces can be borrowed for up to four weeks, and can be checked out at Main Library and Odom Boulevard, North Hill, and Ellet branches.

OhioMeansJobs (OMJ) is Ohio's free career counseling center that connects job seekers with businesses and provides career services to all Ohioans. ASCPL partners with OMJ career coaches to provide guidance on resumes and job searches, as well as with interview preparation.



Hope & Healing

The Hope and Healing Survivor Resource Center (HHSRC) aims to empower survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and human trafficking through emergency shelter, crisis services, and enhanced support. ASCPL partners with HHSRC by hosting drop-in hours to connect the public to case managers who provide resources, emotional support, and education.



Summit County Job and Family Services

Summit County Job and Family Services (SCJFS) Case Managers provide guidance with turning in documents, applying and reapplying for assistance, reporting case changes, and answering case or eligibility questions. ASCPL partners with SCJFS to provide on-site office hours at several Library locations, allowing the public to meet one-onone with case managers.

Sponsored in part by the Akron Rotary Foundation (ARF), the **Youth Author Spotlight provides students in Summit County** the opportunity to meet a best-selling author and engage with them in a public Q&A. This year's featured author was Ohio native justin a. reynolds. Thanks to generous ARF support, each student who attended this year's event was able to take home an autographed copy of justin's book, "Miles Morales: Shock Waves."





SMALL BUSINESS & NON-PROFIT RESOURCE CENTER

ASCPL's Small Business & Nonprofit Resource Center (SBN) provides entrepreneurs, small businesses, and nonprofit organizations with the information, resources, and referrals necessary to reach their goals. SBN membership is free and grants access to custom programming, a free coworking space, and help from our dedicated SBN Librarian.
